IN CHRIST, WE ACHIEVE

Serving the community, exploring the beauty of nature, painting a canvas depicting biblical truth — learning and achievement go far beyond the boundaries of textbooks and lectures. Lakeway Christian Academy (LCA) will seek to develop a love of critical thinking for our students with fun, diversified strategies to reach all learning styles.

LCA seeks to provide a comprehensive education for students, whatever their interest may be. The high school curriculum is college preparatory and ensures that students can be competitive wherever they decide to attend college. Honors classes will be available at all grade levels with Advanced Placement courses offered to qualified students.

In addition to the traditional curriculum, a classical track may be taken. While many of the classes are identical to the traditional track, this track emphasizes the three academic categories of grammar, logic, and rhetoric.

The Grammar Stage

The student learns the basic skills of reading, writing, and mathematics. Students Pre-K – 5th grade are naturally good at memorization, and the grammar stage takes full advantage of this fact. This foundation, from which all other subjects can be approached, is built at our sister school, Cornerstone Christian Academy. End result: Student becomes knowledgeable.

The Logic Stage

The student studies formal logic and argumentation. Students 6th-8th grade have a natural argumentative tendency, which if properly channeled will enable children to think and draw their own conclusions based on facts. End result: Student becomes a thinker.

The Rhetoric Stage

The student learns how to give expression to thoughts. In the high school years, self-expression is very important. The student who is classically trained will be able to communicate their thoughts with eloquence and clarity. End result: Student becomes articulate.

Our curriculum will prepare the student for college or their career path of choice with biblical truth as the fixed point of reference. We help students recognize that all areas of instruction – scientific, historical, mathematical, literary, or artistic – must be understood within the pattern of God's truth as revealed in the Bible.

No matter which academic path a student chooses, we know in Christ, We Rise.

OLD TESTAMENT SURVEY | GRADE 6

This course provides an overview of the authorship and contents of the 39 books of the Old Testament portion of the Bible, particularly noting how God worked throughout history to prepare people for the coming of His Son. Topics include the Creation, the Flood, Abraham and Isaac, lineage to Joseph, the Exodus of God's people, Israel in Canaan and Joshua, the Judges, and spiritual decline, the Kingdom of Israel under Saul, David, and Solomon; the Divided Kingdom; the captivity and stories of Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and Daniel; the Prophets; and the Restoration with the rebuilding of the temple and the walls of Jerusalem. Course units will contain essays, quizzes, and tests to evaluate progress and student mastery.

Semesters: 2

NEW TESTAMENT SURVEY | GRADE 7

This course provides an overview of authorship and contents for the 27 books of the New Testament portion of the Bible, particularly noting the work and ministry of Christ, the role of the Holy Spirit, the life of the church, and the expansion of the gospel. Sections will include the Gospels, Acts of the Apostles, the Pauline and general Epistles, as well as Revelation. Course units will contain essays, quizzes, and tests to evaluate progress and student mastery.

Semesters: 2

BIBLICAL WORLDVIEW | GRADE 8

This course is designed to help students ask and answer life's most basic and important questions, enabling them to develop a thoroughgoing biblical worldview that will shape their minds, hearts, and daily actions. We will also compare and evaluate other popular worldviews for position in the world, testing them against biblical truth. Course units will contain essays, quizzes, and tests to evaluate progress and student mastery.

ENGLISH 6

This course is designed to prepare students to engage with the themes and characters in classic literature for the purpose of pursuing the character of Christ. Students will engage in imaginative literature in the form of short stories, poetry, and novels. Students will also begin to practice basic study skills such as keeping a planner and time management. Students will practice outlining, summarizing, basic research skills, and MLA documentation and formatting. Students will also develop their writing skills through practical and creative assignments with an emphasis on persuasive reasoning, paragraph structure, and revising written work. Through the literature they read, students will analyze and discuss themes such as redemption, forgiveness, bravery, friendship, and coming of age, all from a Biblical perspective.

Semesters: 2

ENGLISH 7

This course is designed to train students to engage with the themes and characters in classic literature for the purpose of pursuing the character of Christ. Students will primarily engage in imaginative literature in the form of short stories, poetry, and novels. Students will master basic study skills such as keeping a planner and time management. Students will continue to practice writing outlines, summarizing, basic research skills, and MLA documentation and formatting. Students will also develop their writing skills through practical and creative assignments with an emphasis on persuasive reasoning, paragraph structure, and revising written work. They will also begin to identify Biblical and non-biblical perspectives in a work of literature with the recognition that "All truth is God's truth.'

Semesters: 2

ENGLISH 8

This course is designed to challenge students to engage with the themes and characters in classic literature for the purpose of contemplating the character of Christ and developing their personal characters. Students will be introduced to a broader spectrum of literature through short story, poetry, and non-fiction units in addition to reading novels. Short story authors may include O. Henry, Arthur Conan Doyle, G.K. Chesterton, and Ray Bradbury. Students will also read and analyze selected poetry and read and discuss selected non-fiction essays and speeches. Grammar will be reviewed for the purpose of application, to personal writing, but the course will primarily focus on literature and composition in preparation for high school. Students will analyze the themes of human nature, loss of innocence, justice, and the implications of the belief that we are all created in the image of God. They will also continue to identify Biblical and nonbiblical perspectives in a work of literature with the recognition that "All truth is God's truth."

 Advanced Prerequisite: At least a B average in English 7 and teacher recommendation

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION

INTRO TO COMPUTER TECHNOLOGY & KEYBOARDING

This is an introduction to keyboarding and computer technology. The students will demonstrate mastery of touch keyboarding using correct keying techniques including correct posture and finger placement. The student will improve speed and accuracy in keyboarding by using appropriate drills and timed writings. Emphasis of the class is placed on letters, numbers, symbols, numeric keypad, and basic word processing applications. the students will explore computer components including hardware and software; various storage devices; printers and their components; and file management techniques (creating folders, saving files, etc.). Students will demonstrate mastery of touch keyboarding and gain an understanding of Microsoft applications. The student will learn to navigate the use of technology ethically and learn how communication tools can help us share the gospel.

• Grade Level: **6, 7, 8**

MS ROBOTICS

Students in this course will develop skills in design, mechanical building, programming, teamwork, leadership, and professional interpersonal communication while designing and building multiple robots for different purposes and goals with VEX Robotics kits. The resources used in this course will include RobotC with easyC programming language and VEX cortex systems. Students will be graded on robot performance in various projects, classwork assignments, presentations and interviews about their robots, and daily recordings in engineering notebooks. Ultimately, this course aims to teach students Biblical principles that are present in engineering as they practice the work of design, knowing that God is the ultimate Designer and Creator.

INTRO TO CULINARY ARTS

Introduction to Culinary Arts is a course designed to introduce team members to fundamental food preparation terms, concepts, and methods in Culinary Arts where laboratory practice will parallel class work. Fundamental techniques, skills, and terminology are covered and mastered with an emphasis on basic kitchen and dining room safety, sanitation, equipment maintenance and operation procedures. Course also provides an overview of the professionalism in the culinary industry and career opportunities leading into a career pathway to Culinary Arts. Food is a gift from God that connects everyone in the world. In this course students gain an understanding of how they can reflect God in the beauty, creativity and mastery of food.

Grade Level: 7, 8

Semesters: 1

STEM EXPOLORATION

This course introduces students to the core fundamental concepts of science and technology through authentic projects. Students experience the interaction of science, technology, engineering, math and literacy through a problem-based learning environment. Students will develop a deeper understanding of scientific inquiry and the engineering design process when solving real-world problems. In this course, student teams apply the engineering design process to create solutions to problems and challenges. They explore a number of technology and engineering tools while learning the basics of design, scale, form and function. The teams utilize drones, robots, and 3D printers in their solutions. They explore forces and loads and apply knowledge to the design of structures. They design systems to convert wind energy to electricity. They apply coding by writing computer code for a gaming environment. As students create useful tools to solve problems, and how God is in all creation. As new technology is developed or old technology is improved upon, we can trace it back to God as the Creator and Sustainer of everything.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC ARTS

INTERMEDIATE MIDDLE SCHOOL BAND

The Intermediate Middle School Band is for students who already have an understanding of basic music reading, instrument assembly and maintenance, correct playing position and sound tone production. Instruction offers continued focus on the refinement of tone quality, technique, aural skills and music literacy. This group will perform in the Lakeway Christmas Concert, both Spring Concerts, adjudicated festivals and other school-related functions. *Only if student is new to Lakeway from a school that did not offer 5th grade beginning band, these students will follow an alternate curriculum until they are able to catch up with the second-year players

- Corequisite: After school rehearsal and performances
- Grade Level: 6

Semesters: 2

PERCUSSION ENSEMBLE

Percussion Ensemble is a class designed to promote and develop musical performance on various percussion instruments. Including but not limited to snare drum, drum set, timpani, marimba, and percussion instruments from other cultures. The students will study and apply percussion performance concepts, to several different styles of music, from classical to music of native origin. Students in this class have the opportunity to participate in various upper-level programs (marching band, pep band, jazz band etc.) upon invitation of the directors.

- Prerequisite—One or more years participating in band (depending on grade), or by audition
- Grade Level: 6, 7, 8

Semesters: 2

ADVANCED MIDDLE SCHOOL BAND (BRASS/WOODWINDS

Advanced Middle School Band is the top performing middle school-level concert band at Lakeway Christian Academy. This group is composed of students on all the major woodwind and brass instruments. Instruction concentrates on advanced technical and expressive skills in an ensemble-focused setting. Membership in the advanced groups is selective as advanced reading, musicianship and student responsibility are required. Students in this class have the opportunity to participate in various upper-level programs (marching band, pep band, jazz band etc.) upon invitation of the directors.

- Prerequisite—6th Grade Beginning Band or by audition
- Corequisite: After school rehearsal and performances
- Grade Level: 7, 8

Semesters: 2

BEGINNING STRINGS ENSEMBLE

Beginning String's purpose is that students learn the love of God and for God, love for others, and the audiation skills of

listening/singing/movement/instrumental performance. Beginning Strings is an opportunity for students to explore the stringed instruments and the art of performing together in a group. Students will learn proper posture, technique, and sight-reading skills, and will have the opportunity to perform for semester performances. Students are required to provide their own instrument of choice to include options of the violin, viola, cello, or bass.

Prerequisite—None

ADVANCED STRINGS ENSEMBLE

Advanced String's purpose is that students learn the love of God and for God, love for others, and the audiation skills of

listening/singing/movement/instrumental performance. While rehearsing and preparing for semester performances, the Ensemble will also master technical scales, arpeggios, and sight-reading. The Ensemble will also learn the art of conducting. Students will have the opportunity to audition for a solo for one or more performances.

- Prerequisite—One of more years participating in Strings Ensemble or mastered Suzuki Violin Book 1
- Grade Level: 6, 7, 8

VISUAL ARTS

MS GRAPHIC DESIGN

In this level course, students will gain knowledge of basic principles of design to include elements of spatial relationships, logo design, Web design, and sequential systems. Students will be introduced to computer concepts, applying logic procedures, and programming procedures to develop interactive multimedia applications. Through this course students will learn more on how to use creative means to honor God and communicate the Good News.

Prerequisite—None

Grade Level: 6, 7, 8

Semesters: 1

MS THEATRE ARTS

This course is designed to offer students the opportunity to enhance their communication skills with drama. Students will learn a biblical foundation of acting, as well as being able to defend why drama is not only an acceptable form of communication, but also how it is essential evangelism tool. Participants in the class will learn acting and effective directing. Students will have the chance to take part in a full-length production where they can put all the principles they have put into use.

Semesters: 1

MS VISUAL ARTS

God is the Creator of all things and in making us in his image has given us each a measure of creativity and appreciation for beauty. In this course, students will endeavor to impart additional knowledge of Art and skills so that God may be glorified in our creativity. Students will explore and learn the course foundational scripture of Exodus 35:35, He has filled them with skill to do all kinds of work as engravers, designers, embroiderers in blue, purple and scarlet yarn and fine linen, and weavers—all of them skilled workers and designers. Levels will be determined by prior course history.

VOCAL MUSIC ARTS

6TH GRADE CHORUS

This class is designed for students who want to learn to sing, students who love to sing, grow in their knowledge of music, and worship our Lord during class. The importance of commitment to the team will also be discovered and applied to this class, as well as life in general. We will predominantly sing sacred choral literature of easy to medium difficulty in a variety of styles and languages. 7TH/8TH GRADE GIRLS CHORUS 7TH/8TH GRADE BOYS CHORUS

Basics of singing will be taught, with music literacy being a point of emphasis, as well as rehearsal techniques and habits. The importance of commitment to the team will also be discovered and applied to this class, as well as life in general. We will predominantly sing sacred choral literature of easy to medium difficulty in a variety of styles and languages. We will mainly do 2 to 3-part harmony and strive for excellence in every aspect of our singing. After-school performances are required. Individual practice, after school practice, sectional rehearsals, and evening/weekend performances are required. The boys and girls chorus will be combined on several concerts to form a concert choir but will perform on concerts as a gender-based group as well.

Semesters: 2

GENERAL ELECTIVES

LOGIC

This course will introduce students to the principles of formal logic. The aim of formal logic is to teach students how to think properly, focusing on the consistency and process of argumentation. Students will also learn how to recognize bad reasoning through a series of thirty-eight lessons on fallacies. Traditional logic is a course on how we form ideas, judgements, and arguments, and how we express them, with an emphasis on the structure of reasoning.

MATHEMATICS

REQUIRED COURSES GRADE Sixth Grade Mathematics 7 Seventh Grade Mathematics 8 Pre-Algebra 8 Algebra I (Honors)

SIXTH GRADE MATHEMATICS

This involves the study of mathematics based on the premise that all math is problem solving. This course is taught from the perspective of the order in God's universe and based on the premise that all things belong to God, and His creation and His word demonstrates the importance of numbering. The course will cover the operations of arithmetic including fractions, decimals. Lessons include class activities with an inquiry and/or discovery-based approach. The course requires students to apply knowledge to new situations in order to gain more depth of knowledge by reasoning through them and applying concepts in new ways.

PRE-ALGEBRA

This course is designed to train students to logically order steps with the goal of solving problems. Students will discover truth through order, which only comes from God, using mathematical operations. This course integrates pre-algebra, algebra, and geometry and includes some advanced math topics. Lessons include class activities with an inquiry/discoverybased approach. Students will apply knowledge to

new situations by reasoning through them and applying concepts in new ways.

SEVENTH GRADE MATHEMATICS

ALGEBRA I (HONORS)

In this course students learn that consistency of mathematical truths demonstrates the orderliness, precision, and consistency of God. Students reinforce mathematical concepts and operations learned in previous years and learn new concepts in increments with daily review and problem sets to prepare them for higher math and science. Algebra I is a transitional course designed to help students move from concrete concepts of arithmetic to abstract concepts of algebra. The importance of a disciplined approach and persistence are essential.

MS PHYSICAL EDUCATION

TThis course emphasizes the need for students to be aware of and improve their personal health. It is a course designed to make students more aware of personal health and how to maintain it during their life. Topics discussed include chapters on drug abuse, tobacco abuse, physical fitness, emergency care, CPR, diseases and others as time allows. This one of the most practical and relevant courses offered. Students will gain deeper understanding of viewing themselves as a temple of the Holy Spirit (I Corinthians 6:19-20).

GENERAL SCIENCE | GRADE 6

In General Science, we aim to develop a knowledge of God and His power as shown in His creation, encourage Christian growth in problem solving and cooperative skills, and promote scientific literacy integrating an appreciation and recognition of how science plays a role in everyday life. Students are introduced to basic concepts from life science, earth and space science, physics, and chemistry in preparation for the coming years of science courses.

Corequisite: Participation in LCA Science Fair

EARTH SCIENCE | GRADE 8

Earth and Space Science involves the study of the nonliving portion of God's creation. In II Peter 3, the importance of looking at the earth and heavens from a believer's perspective is emphasized. This course will focus primarily on these four aspects of science: the earth and geology, the oceans, meteorology, and the heavens and space exploration.

Corequisite: Participation in LCA Science Fair

Semesters: 2

LIFE SCIENCE | GRADE 7

Life Science involves the observation of God's creation, with an emphasis on living things. Observations made are used to make decisions regarding living things and the environment. Emphasis will be placed on making an accurate and precise measurements, and honing observation skills. These will be applied to the Creation Mandate given in Genesis 1:28 to take dominion over the earth and its creatures.

6TH GRADE HISTORY

Sixth grade students will explore the theme of Creation, Fall, and Redemption throughout the course of ancient history. They will expand their understanding of history by studying the people and events that ushered in the down of the major Western and non-Western ancient civilizations. Geography is of special significance in the development of the human story. Students will learn to recognize these patterns in ancient civilizations in Africa, Asia, Europe, and the Americas. Students develop higher levels of critical thinking by considering why civilizations developed where and when they did, why they became dominant, and why they declined. Students analyze the interaction among the various cultures, emphasizing their enduring contributions and the link, despite time, between the contemporary and ancient worlds. Appropriate informational texts and primary sources will be used in order to deepen the understanding and teach a biblical perspective of history.

WORLD HISTORY | GRADE 7

World History students will explore the social, cultural, geographical, political, and technological changes that occurred starting with Creation through the fall of the Roman Empire, Medieval Europe with a heavier emphasis on western civilization in Europe during the Renaissance and Reformation with a biblical perspective. Students will compare and contrast the history and geography of civilizations that were developing concurrently throughout these continents during medieval times. They will examine the growth in economic interactions among civilizations as well as the exchange of ideas, beliefs, technologies, and commodities. Students will learn about the resulting spread of Enlightenment philosophies and the examination of new concepts of reasoning toward religion, government, and science that continue to influence our world today. Students will analyze geography's influence on the development of these civilizations as they continue their study of world history and geography. World History students will end the year by examining the Meso-American civilizations, and the age of European explorations which feeds into the colonization of America. Appropriate informational texts and primary sources will be used in order to deepen the understanding of how these civilizations influence the modern world.

US HISTORY | GRADE 8

In 8th grade U.S History, students study the economic, political, social, and technological changes that have occurred in the United States from its colonial beginnings through the early 20th century. Students will discover main ideas about freedom and equality in the founding documents of our nation, especially the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution. Students will look closely at the arguments over civil liberties, states' rights, and federal powers that have formed around those ideas throughout our nation's history, and continue today. The course will encourage students to develop critical thinking skills and a biblical worldview through diverse activities and primary source documents to analyze American history and how it relates to current events.

MS LATIN A

Students will have mastered: relative and interrogative pronouns, defective verbs, participles, infinitives and their use, gerunds and gerundives, deponent verbs, irregular verbs, indefinite pronouns, purpose clauses, and sequence of tenses.

MS SPANISH A

This course will instruct Spanish through the methodology of Comprehensible Input through Storytelling for beginning Spanish learners. Students will develop the ability to communicate about themselves and their immediate environment using simple sentences containing basic language structures. This communication will be evidenced in all four language skills – listening, speaking, reading and writing. Students will also be introduced to points of culture unique to the Spanish speaking world that will give meaning to words and customs, as opposed to merely defining them.

MS SPANISH 8

This course will instruct Spanish through the methodology of Comprehensible Input through Storytelling for progressing Spanish learners. As a sequel to Spanish A, the course will highlight sheltered comprehensible vocabulary in context, with appropriate grammar instruction. Students will develop the ability to communicate about themselves and their immediate environment using simple sentences containing basic language structures. This communication will be evidenced in all four language skills - listening, speaking, reading and writing. Students will also be introduced to points of culture unique to the Spanish speaking world that will give meaning to words and customs, as opposed to merely defining them. Students completing this course will be prepared for High School level Spanish I instruction.

SPANISH I

This course will instruct Spanish through the methodology of Comprehensible Input through Storytelling for first year Spanish learners. The course will highlight comprehensible vocabulary in context, with appropriate grammar instruction. Students will develop the ability to communicate about themselves and their immediate environment. This communication will be evidenced in all four language skills - listening, speaking reading and writing - with emphasis on the ability to communicate orally and in writing. Students will also be introduced to points of culture that will give meaning to words and customs, as opposed to merely defining them. For middle school students in grade 8, this credit becomes a part of the high school transcript, is included in the determination of the high school grade point average (GPA) and counts toward fulfilling the world languages requirements of the high school diploma. It also counts toward the total number of credits required for graduation.
